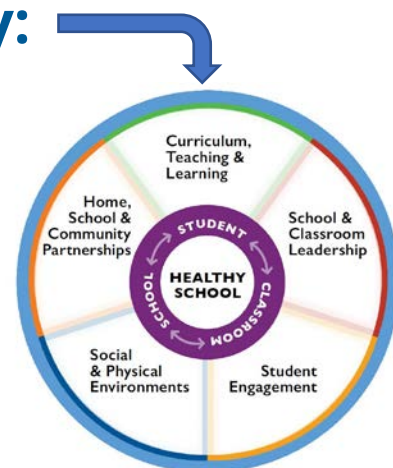
'Snowball' Discussion Activity

Grade:

7-12 – content should be adapted by facilitator/teacher to meet the needs and developmental stage of the group

Purpose/Outcome

Students will demonstrate an understanding of the characteristics needed to build healthy social and intimate relationships

Time commitment: 20-30 min

Space and Materials Required

- Blank white paper for each student
- Pencil for each student
- HPEPH Healthy Sexuality Self-Reflection Student Resource for each student
- HPEPH Healthy Relationship Poster

Instructions

1. Discuss ground rules for the group – respect each other, no name calling, one person speaks at a time, confidential setting, cell phones away

2. Introduce the topic, healthy relationships, and the activity 'snowball' as a way of discussing healthy relationships as a class
3. Give each student a blank piece of white paper and a pencil or pen
4. Ask question one – **'What are some types of relationships?'** – Using the paper provided, ask students to write down their thoughts on the different types of relationships that exist. Give the students a couple minutes to complete. Once everyone has had a chance to write their thoughts down, ask the students to crumple their paper like a snowball and toss them around at each other (only throw to someone who is looking). Alternatively, snowballs can be thrown into a basket in the middle of the room. After all the snowballs are in the basket; everyone retrieves a snowball
5. Once everyone has a snowball, ask students to uncrumple it and share responses – many types of relationships should be mentioned – friends, family romantic, coach, teachers
6. With the same paper, ask question 2 – **What are some characteristics of a healthy relationship?** Repeat the process of writing their thoughts, crumpling their paper and tossing the snowballs. Once everyone has a snowball back, ask for one student to write the shared responses on the board (this helps visual learners to see the characteristics of a healthy relationship). Once the sharing is complete, use the HPEPH healthy relationship poster to summarize the characteristics of a healthy relationship, unhealthy relationship and abusive relationship. If appropriate, leave the poster displayed in the class
7. Ask question 3 – **What are some ways to get out of an unhealthy relationship or help a friend get out of one? Or What are some characteristics of an unhealthy relationship?** Repeat snowball process. For grade seven and eight use the Canadian Centre for Child Protection's 'What's the Deal? Grades 7/8 Activity Book' pages 22-25 for summary discussion on personal boundaries and when to seek help. For grades nine to twelve use the Canadian Centre of Child Protection's 'It is a Big Deal Grade 9-12 Activity Book' pages 27 – 30 for summary discussions related to uncomfortable situations
8. Provide each student with a HPEPH healthy sexuality self-reflection student resource to complete in class if time permits or as a take home activity

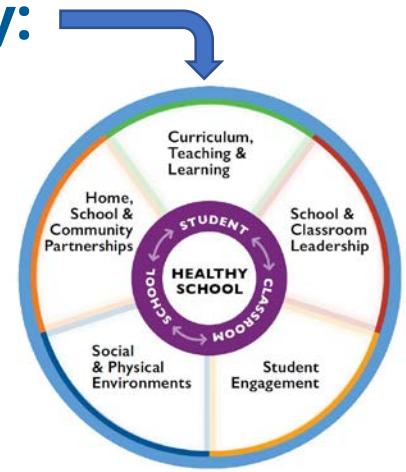
