

Active TB Screening Checklist for Clinicians

Please remember, the elderly may not present with classic signs and symptoms of active TB Disease. In the elderly, consider tuberculosis in the differential diagnosis of failure to thrive and unexplained fatigue.

*If there are concerning findings on either the review of symptoms or the chest x-ray, three sputum for acid-fast bacilli (AFB) and culture should be ordered for collection at least one hour apart, to rule out active TB.
